It's been a busy and successful year for your Woodcreek Neighborhood Association (WNA) Board. Here are some of this year's accomplishments and plans for the future:

- Grant approval for new signage at the Woodcreek north entrance. The new sign will be installed this winter.
- Erosion management along the Hutton Branch Creek. Rocks have been placed along the creek to curtail the erosion. Renovation of the creek through Woodcreek is included in the upcoming bond package.
- Study of ways to eliminate cut-thru traffic from Kelly Boulevard to the commercial centers off of Driftwood.
- Increased security measures for Woodcreek entrances and back alleys.
- Plans for fence construction along the railroad tracks to prevent intruders from coming into our neighborhood.
- Completion of a cost study on the repainting of the lamp posts throughout Woodcreek 1 & 2. We will consider painting the posts in 2018 after the sign project is completed.
- Significant increase in membership at all levels. It is your support that allows the Board to address issues
 affecting our neighborhood. The time to join or renew your membership in the Woodcreek

Woodcreek Neighborhood Wins City Grant

Our request to the city for a Neighborhood Matching Grant was approved. Thanks to Liz

Messner for a very professional presentation to the city Neighborhood Advisory Committee.

Phase one of the project, to install energy efficient LED light fixtures on the walking bridge across the creek, has been completed. The new fixtures focus light directly on the bridge and reduce spillover into the neighborhood.



They will also reduce our electric bill and the need to regularly replace burned out bulbs. They are controlled by a photosensor so the bridge will always be lit during evening hours. Stop by and check them out.

The second phase of the grant will be to improve the landscaping at the Woodcreek entry and install a new monument sign. On October 21st we held our annual meeting and celebrated our project kickoff with an Oktoberfest meal at the Woodcreek entry. We were excited to have Mayor Kevin Falconer join in the fun. Before the meeting we had a contractor trim the entry trees to improve visibility of oncoming traffic for



drivers exiting onto Kelly Blvd. After the meeting everyone put in some sweat equity for the project by gathering and stacking the trimmed branches. Thanks to all of the volunteers.

Design of the new monument sign specifications is in progress at the city. It will then go out for bid. We anticipate construction will begin sometime after

the first of the year. Next spring, we will be requesting residents to volunteer their time to assist in removing the old sign and landscaping and install new landscaping. This will satisfy our commitment to the city to foster community involvement and contribute 1/3 of the grant project cost.

CREEK UPGRADES - Public Works Department proposes \$2 Million Investment

During the first week of November, the city spent several days with a backhoe filling washouts and clearing silt along the creek adjacent to Kelly Blvd. Additional work is needed to replace a missing section of the pilot channel and to address silting of the creek bed and erosion of the channel throughout Woodcreek.

Public Works has proposed a \$2M project as part of the upcoming bond election to address the creek infrastructure needs in the Woodcreek neighborhood and near Trinity Mills Rd. The election is tentatively planned for May 2018.



The Woodcreek Neighborhood Association (WNA) is closely monitoring the progress of the proposal and lobbying to have it included in the bond election. Carrollton has a long tradition of seeking voter approval of planned major projects to assure they are addressing community needs. Approved bonds will only be sold over an approximate five-year period if current economic conditions allow. We encourage residents to support the bond election.

WOODCREEK CUT-THRU TRAFFIC



The WNA Board seeks your help to reduce cut-thru traffic on Woodcreek.

The shopping center at the SE corner of Driftwood and Trinity Mills has requested removal of the Driftwood turn restriction into the shopping center. The request is on the agenda for the Carrollton Traffic Advisory Committee (TAC) on **December 11** at **7pm** in the City Hall council workroom 1945 E. Jackson Road.

Proposals to reduce cut-thru traffic on Woodcreek:

- **1** Maintain the turn restrictions on Driftwood.
- **2** Have the TAC request increased police enforcement.
- 3 Install a "NO THRU TRAFFIC" sign at the Woodcreek entry.
